The school recognizes that as new digital tools, apps and social media platforms are created, students will be faced with new online concerns, issues and challenges. This creates the potential for misuse of the internet, for example, sending or receiving inappropriate information and images (e.g. racist, slanderous, pornographic, threatening, sexist, confidential, etc.) or using chat rooms for this purpose.

Talking to Children and Youth about Decriminalization and Substance Use: Resources for Parents/Guardians and Caregivers

As you may be aware, at the end of January Health Canada granted the Province of British Columbia an exemption from the federal Controlled Drugs and Substances Act, allowing the removal of criminal penalties for possession of small amounts of certain illicit substances for personal use. Decriminalizing people who use drugs is a part of the Government's work to tackle the toxic drug crisis, intended to remove the shame and stigma associated with substance use and support people in accessing important health and social services.

To be clear, this exemption does not apply to licensed child care or K-12 school properties. The federal Controlled Drugs and Substances Act continues to apply to these settings, meaning there will continue to be criminal penalties for possession of illegal substances, regardless of amount, while on child care and or K-12 school properties. This exemption also does not apply to youth aged 17 and younger, who will continue to be subject to the federal Youth Criminal Justice Act (YCJA). This means that youth aged 17 and younger will not be permitted to possess illicit substances in any amount.

We recommend that parents/guardians read the information sheet on substance use decriminalization for parents, guardians, and caregivers. Talking to Children and Youth about Decriminalization and Substance Use: Resources for Parents/Guardians and Caregivers is now available on the *erase* website. The Ministry of Education and Child Care's Expect Respect and A Safe Education (erase) substance use website also



provides students, parents/guardians, caring adults and educators with information and resources to support conversations with youth about substance use.

Establishing Respectful Relationships and Consent in Our Communities Parent Session - 90-minute session

This session will explore the topic of consent, and the dynamics of gender-based violence. It will discuss the current state of gender relations faced by our children in both the physical and digital landscape, as well as the potential for exploitation within these relationships. Trainers will provide Parents/Caregivers tips and tools on how discuss these topics with their children to create positive family connections.

TOPICS COVERED WILL INCLUDE:

- What defines consent? A discussion
- The dynamics of gender-based violence

• An overview of worrisome content, and how to manage their child's exposure on popular social media and gaming platforms

- The different types of bullying and cyberbullying relationships
- The pathway to sextortion and human trafficking-important signs to look for
- The importance of checking in on our children's mental health and strategies for success
- Family suggestions, as well as tips to facilitate positive conversations and outcomes



2023-24 Student Registration

Student registration for the 2023/24 school year opened on February 6 at 8:30am. Applications are being accepted for students entering Grade 8-12. Parents/guardians whose Grade 7 child currently attends Gray or Brooke Elementary Schools do not need to submit an application. Students who wish to attend Sands Secondary and do not currently attend one of the two catchment elementary schools (Brooke or Gray) are strongly encouraged to apply as early as possible once the registration process opens. Please note that only online applications are being accepted. Parents/guardians who require access to a computer or assistance in completing an application form should visit the school office for support, In order to submit an application, please visit the <u>school district website.</u>



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School Schedule Decision-Making Process

Since returning from Winter Break, all seven secondary schools in Delta are reviewing their schedules for next year to decide on a long-term schedule. When the pandemic started in March of 2020, schools changed to different schedules to be able to pivot based on the COVID situation. Now, we are at a place with the pandemic that will allow us to review whether we wish to maintain our current semester schedule or investigate other schedules.

Prior to the pandemic, Sands Secondary followed a linear schedule where students were responsible for 8 classes over a period of 10 months. Students would experience their 8 classes on a Day 1 (4 classes) and a Day 2 (4 classes) schedule rotation throughout the school year. As one can imagine, there are many different schedules with their benefits and their drawbacks.

The decision for next year's schedule will be based on feedback from the student, family and staff surveys that were conducted last Spring and discussions with staff. The district has set out a timeline for secondary schools to inform them of their decision:

February 28 – secondary schools notify the district March 7 – all 7 schedule decisions presented to the Trustees March 9 – families will be notified of the schedule decision for September 2023


Indigenous Focused Graduation Requirement

As part of the Province of British Columbia's commitments to truth, reconciliation and anti-racism, the Ministry of Education in collaboration with the First Nations Education Steering Committee (FNESC), announced that it is implementing a new Indigenous-focused graduation requirement. Expected to take effect in the 2023-24 school year, this requirement will ensure all secondary students complete Indigenous-focused coursework before they graduate from B.C.'s K-12 education system. This means that students must complete a 4 credit Indigenous-focused course as part of their 80 credits required for graduation.

As a result of this announcement by the Ministry of Education, students will have an opportunity to select from the following list of courses to satisfy the Indigenous-focused requirement and either their English or Social Studies requirement:

B.C. First Peoples 12 English First Peoples – Literary Studies + New Media 11

Dry Grad 2023



COVID-19 Safety Guidelines



Mental Wellness Resources


